
FALL ENHANCEMENTS

To maintain a lush healthy lawn, we recommend aerating and over-seeding. This will help to improve turf thickness, and achieve a uniform appearance overall. Aerating also allows for enhanced thatch breakdown, and improved resiliency and cushioning.

If one of your goals is to freshen up the existing landscape, you may want to consider a fall landscape enhancement by H&M. Is my lawn dead? I hear that question every year, but particularly this summer. The good news is that turf grasses have an excellent dormancy mechanism that allows them to tolerate most droughts. The bad news is that there is no way to visually tell whether the grass is dead, or just dormant. So when someone tells you your turf is dormant, they're likely taking a (usually correct) guess. Once rain returns in late summer and early fall, your lawn will either green up, indicating it was dormant, or it won't, meaning it's dead. Usually this isn't an all or nothing situation. Portions of the lawn will green up, while other parts won't. The big question is, why does this occur?

All grasses can go dormant, but those that have damaged or compromised root systems may not be able to tolerate much moisture stress. Poor soils, insects, or diseases can result in a reduced root system, and thus plants that can't tolerate harsh droughts. If you suspect this is the case, then an irrigation system will be necessary to ensure survival.

As good as grasses are at surviving drought, even dormant turfs require some water. These turfs survive because their need to water is reduced to a small fraction of the needs of green, growing turf. They also have a few deep roots that can continue to

extract small amounts of water from the earth. Once these roots have used all available soil moisture, these dormant plants will die as well. A healthy Kentucky bluegrass lawn should be able to survive at least six weeks without any rainfall or irrigation. If the drought extends beyond this, it is wise to lightly irrigate your turf with approximately 1/4" of water every two weeks. This will provide enough water to keep your lawn alive, but not bring it out of dormancy. It is important not to water so much as to bring the turf out of dormancy; let natural rainfall do that. You simply want to keep enough moisture in the ground that the dormant turf stays alive.

There are new turf grasses that have been developed to tolerate summer droughts, and have done very well. If your lawn doesn't recover this fall, I recommend using one of the new turf grass varieties that are currently available in reseeding your lawn. Dormancy is a water-saving feature of turf grasses, and a healthy lawn can survive most summers without irrigation and recover fully in late summer or early fall.

WINTERIZING YOUR LANDSCAPE

My, how time flies! It's hard to believe, but winter weather is just around the corner. In the interest of helping protect your landscape investment, this month I'm outlining a few key concepts that are extremely beneficial to helping your lawn, plants, and hardscape survive the harsh Northeast Ohio winter.

Lawn Care

- AERATION: The benefits of aerating your lawn are many, but specifically in the fall with cool temperatures and wet conditions. This is really effective to breaking down the thatch layer under turf.
- MOWING: Trim your lawn slowly over the next couple of months to about a
 5 inch height. By having a very low cut prior to the winter, you can minimize snow mold and other fungus issues the following spring.
- 3. FALL FERTILIZATION: You can see the difference by driving down the street. Some of your neighbors have green lawns all winter, while others are yellow and faded. An application of high nitrogen fertilizer in the mid to late fall will not only keep you looking green, but give your lawn a head start next spring.

Bed Maintenance

- 1. PRUNING: You are going to look at defoliated vegetation for the next five to six months. Having shrubs with well maintained shape and form makes that not so noticeable.
- WATERING: Believe it or not, even during winter plants require water to survive. I like to heavily water my beds during late October, early November to ensure the plants have enough moisture to help them survive over winter and get off to a good start in the spring.
 CLEAN UP: Removing leaves, sticks, and other debris prior to winter setting in will help keep insects from overwintering and becoming an infestation problem the next season.

Hardscape Preparation

- 1. FURNITURE: Remove all metal objects from the patio/walk to avoid rust staining.
- 2. DEBRIS: Clean leaves and debris. Anything left to go to compost will stain, which is extremely difficult to remove and can sometimes be permanent.
- 3. DE-ICING PRODUCT: Should you be using a deicer on your walk/patio, calcium and/or blended products are far superior to rock salt in low temperature melting capability, and are significantly less corrosive. It's worth the couple extra dollars to protect your investment.
